EASTERN, SOUTHERN MAINE SPLIT LITTLE EAST DOUBLEHEADER

In battle of conference's premier programs, Warriors hold on for second-game win

SOUTH PORTLAND, Maine -- Eastern Connecticut State University and the University of Southern Maine -- the most dominant teams in the 13-year history of the Little East Conference -- renewed their Little East Conference baseball rivalry Friday afternoon by splitting a doubleheader at the Wainright Athletic Complex.

Ranked No. 4 in New England, Southern Maine (15-7, 4-2 little east) rallied from a two-run deficit to take the opening game 4-2 behind the two-hit, relief effort of sophomore left-hander Mark Schmidt to end a four-game futility streak against the Warriors. Eastern (15-10-1, 4-3 little east) salvaged a split in the nightcap by building a 9-1 lead after 8 ½ innings, then hanging on for a 9-6 victory.

In the opener, Schmidt (4-0) came on to replace sophomore starter Collin Henry in the fourth inning after Henry was hurt making a catch on an infield pop up. Schmidt went the final 5 2/3 innings, allowing two hits and one run while striking out four to run his record to 4-0.

The Warriors scored the first run of the game in the fourth on a squeeze bunt by junior **Andrew Magliola** (East Haven) that brought home rookie **Jim Schult** (Wappinger Falls, NY). Schult had led off the inning with a double. Eastern made it 2-0 in the fifth on a leadoff homer by junior All-America **Shawn Gilblair** (Windham) – his team-leading eighth of the year and the 16th of his three-year career. After Gilblair's homer, however, Schmidt did not allow another hit and only one baserumer the rest of the way.

Southern Maine wiped out the two-run deficit by scoring the go-ahead runs in the sixth. With two out and a runner on first, junior Anthony D'Alfonso singled, junior Josh Stowell doubled home a run, and sophomore Josh Mackey singled in the tying and go-ahead runs. The Huskies picked up an insurance run in the seventh on two singles and a throwing error and chased Gilblair (1-3) in favor of senior righty **Joe Esposito (East Haven).**

Sophomore All-America **Melvin Castillo (Danbury)** recorded his 100th career hit in his 75rh career game with a double. The game was the third one for Gilblair since returning from a pulled hamstring that cost him six games.

In the nightcap, the Warriors jumped out to a 5-0 lead in the first three innings against USM senior right-hander Adam Ross. Gilblair and Schult had RBIs in the first inning. Gilblair had an RBI double and first-year sophomore **Travis Bass (West Hartford)** added a two-run double in the third—one of his three hits.

Eastern staked junior starter **Jimmy Jagodzinski** (**Greenwich**) to an 8-1 lead and Jagodzinski allowed only one run through the first seven innings before the Huskies chased him in a five-run eighth inning that cut the Eastern lead to 8-6. The win was the staff-leading fifth of the year for Jagodzinski. Bass , who had the game-winning hit in the bottom of the 12th inning Thursday against Roger Williams University, had a home run and drove in a career-high four runs (one shy of his season total) and matched Parke with three hits. Gilblair also had two hits and plated two runs.

The Warriors picked up single runs in the four consecutive innings to expand their lead to 9-1. Bass had an RBI single in the fifth and hit a solo homer in the seventh. Senior **Jon Dalton** (**Standish**, **ME**)) chased home a run in the sixth with a triple, and Parke hit a solo shot in the eighth.

Southern Maine made things interesting by driving Jagodzinski from the mound in the eighth in favor of senior lefty **Jake Slate (Poughkeepsie, NY)** by scoring five runs. Four of the runs came on one swing of the bat -- a grand slam homer by junior Ryan Pike. Southern Maine brought the tying run to the plate in the ninth against first-year sophomore righty **Chris Wojick (Uncasville)** - the fourth of four pitchers who threw a pitch in the eighth inning – who was able to nail down the win. Wojick had entered the game with the bases loaded and Eastern leading 9-2 in the eighth. He got a strikeout, but then served up Pike's bases-clearing blast.

Sophomore **John Parke** (**Middlefield**) extended his hitting streak to 18 games with two hits in the first game and three hits in the second game. One of his three hits in the second game was his first home run of the year, giving him a team-high 38 hits. Parke had only eight hits and collected only 32 at-bats on the varsity level last year.

MANSFIELD, Conn. – Senior third baseman **Trey Bongiovanni (Meriden)** tied the game in the bottom of the eighthi inning with a two-run single and first-year sophomore second baseman **Travis Bass (West Hartford)** won it with a one-out single in the 12th as the Eastern Connecticut State University baseball team prevailed over Roger Williams University, 4-3, Thursday afternoon at the Eastern Baseball Stadium.

The win is the fourth this year for Eastern (14-9-1) and fifth in as many games with Roger Williams (15-8) in this series. Roger Williams had won eight of ten entering the game.

Junior first baseman **Tristan Hobbes** (Utica, NY) opened the 12th inning for Eastern with an opposite-field single and moved into scoring position on a sacrifice bunt by senior rightfielder **Jon Dalton** (Standish, ME). Castillo and Bass, who came into the game as an eighth-inning pinch hitter, had two hits each. Castillo also reached three additional times on two walks (one intentional) and a hit-by-pitch. Castillo's leadoff single in the eighth was the 99th of his 74-game career.

Sophomore leftfielder **John Parke** (**Middlefield**) extended his hitting streak to 16 games when he singled up the middle leading off the sixth inning and came around to score the first run of the game.

Roger Williams freshman righty Sam Podbelski (East Greenwich, RI) did not allow an earned run over his seven-inning stint but left on the short end of a I-0 score. Podbelski fanned four and walked two and gave up only four hits.

CASTILLO'S GRAND SLAM LEADS EASTERN BASEBALL TO 10-5 WIN Against SC, Gilblair has three hits upon return, Parke extends hitting streak to 15

MANSFIELD, Conn. - Sophomore All-America Melvin Castillo (Danbury, CT) hit a grand slam on a two-strike pitch in the fifth inning and junior All-America Shawn Gilblair (Windham, CT) had three hits and scored a run upon his return from an injury when the Eastern Connecticut State University baseball team posted a 10-5 non-conference victory over Springfield College Wednesday afternoon at the Eastern Baseball Stadium.

A winner of three straight and four of its last five, Eastern (13-9) never trailed in the game, collecting 15 hits and breaking open a one-run game when Castillo launched his fifth home run of the season over the left field fence with none out and the bases loaded in the fifth. No. 9 hitter Andrew Magliola (East Haven, CT) and leadoff hitter John Parke (Middlefield, CT) singled to open the inning and a walk to Ismael Bolorin (Manchester, CT) loaded the bases and spelled the end of Springfield starting righty Travis Turgeon (Norwich, CT). Facing reliever Justin O'Brien (Norfolk, MA), Castillo drove an 0-2 pitch over the fence in left field – the 19th home run of his two-year career.

Parke extended his hitting streak to 15 games as one of three hitters with three hits for Eastern. In addition to Parke – who leads the Warriors with 11 multiple-hit games – Magliola had his first career three-hit game, and Gilblair added three hits after returning to the lineup after missing six games with a hamstring pull. Parke also scored three runs and stole a base.

Eastern freshman Andrew Dewing (Swampscott, MA) had his third straight multiple-hit game and freshman Pat Smith (Milford, PA) matched him with two hits. Batting eighth, Smith drove in three runs with a two-run double down the left field line that snapped a 1-1 tie in the third inning, and also plated a run in the seventh with a two-out opposite-field single to right.

In his seventh appearance, sophomore lefty Wes Dutton (Waterbury, CT) gained his first career win in his first decision. The third of five Eastern pitchers, Dutton allowed one run in 2 2/3 innings while fanning three without a walk.

Trailing 5-2 in the fifth, Springfield had five straight hits and scored two runs to start the inning and chase Eastern's Ronnie Newkirk (New Milford, CT) in favor of Dutton. Dutton got a force out and strikeout to end the inning, and Castillo hit his grand slam in the bottom of the inning to push Eastern's lead to 9-4.

BABSON PARK, Mass. Led by freshman **Andrew Dewing (Swampscott, MA**), four first-year players combined for eight hits and six runs in powering the Eastern Connecticut State University baseball team to

a 16-4 non-conference win over Babson College Monday afternoon at Govani Field.

Eastern (12-9-1) broke a scoreless tie by scoring nine runs in the top of the third inning on six hits, two hit batsmen, a walk, and two errors. BEHIND JAGODZINSKI, EASTERN BASEBALL GAINS LEC SPLIT

Junior righty contributes fourth straight quality start as teams trade 3-2 wins

MANSFIELD, Conn. - Junior righty Jimmy Jagodzinski (Greenwich) contributed his fourth straight quality start to help lift the Eastern Connecticut State University baseball team to a 3-2 Little East Conference victory over the University of Massachusetts Boston and a split of a Sunday doubleheader at the Eastern Baseball Stadium.

After 2006 conference Pitcher-of-the-Year Nick Conway shut down Eastern (11-9-1, 3-2 little east) on four singles in UMass Boston's (9-12, 3-1 little east) 3-2 first-game win, Jagodzinski (4-2) returned the favor by stopping the Beacons on three singles through seven innings in the nightcap. Jagodzinski, who lowered his ERA from 4.10 to 3.57 with the performance, fanned seven and walked two and gave up both UMass runs - one of which was unearned – before first-year sophomore righty Chris Wojick (Uncasville) fanned four over the final two innings to earn his second save.

In his last four starts covering 25 innings, Jagodzinski has allowed only 20 hits while striking out 22 and walking only seven.

Eastern scored all of the runs it would need in support of Jagodzinski on four singles and a stolen base in the first inning. Sophomore outfielder John Parke (Middlefield), who had hits in both games to extend his hitting streak to 13, singled to open the inning and later scored the first run on a single by freshman first baseman Andrew Dewing (Swampscott, MA). Senior leftfielder Jon Dalton (Standish, ME) made it 2-0 with a two-out single that plated sophomore All-America shortstop Melvin Castillo (Danbury). The Warriors added another run after there were two out and none on in the third on a double by Dewing and a bases-loaded walk to sophomore second baseman Travis Horrigan (Roxbury).

A leadoff error in the fifth helped the Beacons break through against Jagodzinski, who retured the first eight batters in order.

Dewing, batting cleanup in place of injured All-America junior DH Shawn Gilblair (Windham), had his first career three-hit game, while Castillo and Parke each added two hits in the nine-hit attack.

Conway (3-1), a senior righty and the 2006 LEC Pitcher-of-the-Year, stymied Eastern in the opener on four singles and four walks. He did not allow an earned run in the routegoing effort while fanning six.

UMass snapped a 2-2 tie in the eighth inning by scoring an unearned run without a hit off freshman righty Ronnie Newkirk (New Milford). In his third inning in place of senior starter Joe Esposito (East Haven), Newkirk hit a batter and issued an intentional walk in the eighth before departing in favor of Wojick. A stolen base and throwing error accounted for the game-winning run. Esposito gave up only six hits and one earned run through five innings but did not figure in the decision.

Trailing 3-2, the Warriors threatened in the eighth against Conway when an error and intentional walk put two runners on with one out, but Conway got fly ball outs to subdue the threat.

FONTAINE FANS 17 IN LITTLE EAST WIN OVER WESTERN

Strikeout total only two behind record as Warriors post 5-0 conference victory

MANSFIELD, Conn. - Sophomore right-handed pitcher Matt Fontaine (Cranston, RI) equalled his season total with 17 strikeouts in throwing the first complete game and first shutout of his career as the Eastern Connecticut State University baseball team shut out Western Connecticut State University, 5-0, Saturday afternoon at the Eastern Baseball Stadium.

In the fifth start of the season and of his career, the 6-foot-3 inch, 230-pounder faced just four batters over the minimum by giving up two singles and a double and walking one. Fontaine (2-1) , who had 17 strikeouts in 24.1 innings over five appearances this year prior to Saturday, struck out every batter in the Western (8-12, 0-3 little east) lineup at least once. He fanned the top four hitters in the lineup a total of nine times. Fontaine threw 108 pitches and completed the shutout in exactly two hours.

Eastern (10-8-1) is ranked seventh in New England.

Fontaine enjoyed his longest career outing despite pitching on only three days rest. On Tuesday here, he pitched into the sixth inning of a 7-6 loss to Montelair State University. In that game, he allowed eight hits (four for extra bases) and four earned runs while striking out only two and walking one. After Saturday's performance, Fontaine lowered his ERA from 5.92 to 4.32 and now has 34 strikeouts and only three walks in 33 1/3 innings.

"Coming off three days' rest, everything felt good today," said Fontaine afterward. "I found out (Friday) I'd be pitching on only three days' rest, but I'd done it in the past and (pitching coach Ron Isler) had a great game plan. My slider and fastball... everything was working. After the first batter of the game swung at that first pitch, we knew they'd be free-swinging. (Coach Isler) called a great game. All the credit goes to him. He's helped me out a lot this year."

Of the other ten outs other than strikeouts, only three were recorded by outfielders as the Colonials managed to put runners in scoring position only three times in the game: on a one-out double in the second, back-to-back singles with two out in the fifth and a walk and ground ball in the seventh. Fontaine retired ten straight after Patrick Kantor's double in the second, and ended the game by retiring the final eight batters - four on strikes. Fontaine did not give up another hit after Jeff Gordon and John DiGiovanni stroked back-to-back singles to center in the fifth inning of a scoreless game. He ended that fifth-inning threat with a swinging strikeout.

It marks the third-most strikeouts by a pitcher in Eastern history. Ryan DiPietro and John Caneira hold the record with 19 strikeouts, and four pitchers have struck out 18 in a game.

Fontaine struck out the side in the third and fourth innings and got a swinging strikeout to start the fifth to make it seven strikeouts in a row. He struck out at least two batters in six straight innings.

Fontaine and Western sophomore lefty Joe Mangano were locked in a scoreless duel through five innings before the Warriors broke through in the bottom of the sixth, chasing Mangano in the process. A sacrifice fly by freshman rightfielder Jim Schult (Wappingers Falls, NY) plated sophomore leftfielder John Parke (Middlefield) with the first run of the game. Parke singled to open the inning, went to second on a sacrifice bunt, and stole third.

Eastern tacked on four insurance runs in the seventh when they had three hits, a walk and hit-by-pitch. Parke's sacrifice fly made it 2-0 and junior first baseman **Tristan Hobbes (Utica, NY)** and sophomore **Mike Palo (Brookfield)** drove in runs with hits, and a ground ball plated another. Palo drove in his first collegiate run with a two-out pinch RBI double.

Parke and senior third baseman **Trey Bongiovanni (Meriden)** each had two hits, with Parke extending his current hitting streak to 11 games - the most by an Eastern player this year.

Red Hawks hit three home runs in posting fifth straight victory, 7-6

MANSFIELD, Conn. – Rob Bowness hit a game-tying three-run home run in the top of the sixth inning and Jeff Miller hit the second of his two home runs to provide insurance in the ninth inning as the Montclair State University baseball team outslugged Eastern Connecticut State University, 7-6, Tuesday afternoon at the Eastern Baseball Stadium.

The win is the fifth straight for Montclair (9-7), which defeated Eastern (9-8) for the 15th time in 17 games against the Warriors at Eastern's ball park.

Six of Montclair's runs came on home runs, with Miller hitting a solo home run (his first of the year) to give Montclair a 1-0 lead in the third and a two-run home run in the ninth to make it 7-4. Rob Bowness hit a key three-run home run with two out in the sixth inning off sophomore righty **Matt Fontaine (Cranston, RI)** that tied the game at 4-4.

Trailing 7-4 in the ninth, Eastern scored twice on sophomore All-America Melvin Castillo's (Danbury) two-out, two-run bases loaded single to left, but the Warriors stranded the tying and winning runs when reliever Stephen Piscitello got pinch hitter Jim Schult (Wappingers Falls, NY) on an infield popup to end the game. Eastern had loaded the bases on a walk to sophomore third baseman Travis Bass (West Hartford), an infield single by sophomore leadoff hitter John Parke (Middlefield), and a hit-batsman to junior pinch hitter Andrew Smiley (North Kingstown, RI). The one-out walk to Bass signaled the end to Montelair senior righty Tim Stringer in favor of Piscitello, the team's starting third baseman.

Eastern scored four unearned runs in the third to take a 4-1 lead off Montclair senior lefty Kevin Dalton, who was coming off eight shutout innings against 2007 national champion Kean University Thursday. With two out and two on in the third, Castillo doubled in two runs and freshman first baseman **Andrew Dewing (Swampscott, MA)** followed with a two-run home run to left-center. From that point until the ninth, however, the Warriors managed only three hits and four baserunners off Dalton and two relievers.

Making his fourth start, Fontaine allowed only three hits (two doubles and a home run) through five innings and carried a 4-1 lead into the sixth. With two out and two on, Bowness unloaded his second home run of the season over the right-center field wall to tie the game. After the next two batters reached, Fontaine was replaced by junior righty **Jimmy Jagodzinski (Greenwich)**, who got a strikeout to end the inning but allowed the go-ahead run in the seventh on two singles and a double play ground ball.

Miller of Montclair was 4-for-5 with two home runs, three RBI and three runs scored. Castillo and Dewing – batting 3-4 in the order for Eastern – each had two hits and scored a run and combined for all six of Eastern's RBI. Castillo has hit safely in 16 of 17 games this year and has collected two hits in six of his last seven contest. Castillo has already compiled 92 hits in only 67 career games.

Eastern played without 2007 national Player-of-the-Year Shawn Gilblair, who pulled a hamstring Sunday and will be lost indefinitely.

Castillo's bases-clearing single sparks four-run rally in seventh inning of opener

MANSFIELD, Conn. Sophomore All-America shortstop **Melvin Castillo's (Danbury)** basesclearing single sparked a four-run rally in the seventh inning of the opener as Eastern Connecticut State University and No. 9 nationally-ranked Keene State College opened their Little East Conference baseball seasons by splitting a doubleheader at the ECSU Baseball Stadium Sunday afternoon.

In a re-match of the championship round of last year's Little East Conference and NCAA Division III New England regional tournaments – won by Eastern -- Keene State (12-4, 1-1 little east) snapped Eastern's 15-game regular-season conference winning streak in the nightcap by scoring two unearned runs on three hits and two errors in the fourth inning of the nightcap in a 4-3 victory. Eastern (9-7, 1-1 little east) won the opener, 7-4. Last year, the Warriors were the first team to win all 14 of its conference regular-season contests.

In the second game Sunday, Castillo and junior pitcher/DH **Shawn Gilblair (Windham)** hit back-to-back home runs in the bottom of the first inning to give the Warriors a 2-1 lead, but 6-foot-6 inch Keene senior righty Phil Mabey settled down to allow only four hits and one run thereafter until being lifted with a runner aboard in the eighth. Senior rightfielder Greg Ford, who had hit a solo home run to give Keene a 4-2 lead in the sixth, recorded his fourth save by pitching the final two innings of the nightcap. Ford gave up Gilblair's RBI single in the eighth but survived an opening error in the ninth inning to strand two runners and end the game.

Gilblair (1-2), last year's Division III National Player-of-the-Year, pulled a muscle in his leg while running the bases on his RBI single in the eighth, and was replaced on the mound to start the minth inning by first-year sophomore righty **Chris Wojick (Uncasville)**. Gilblair (1-2) had given up eight hits while fanning seven without a walk through eight innings of the second game, and two of the four runs charged to him were unearned.

With his team leading 4-3 in the first game, Keene senior righty Jamie Morin walked the bases loaded in the seventh and Castillo's two-run single and an outfield error cleared the bases and gave the Warriors a 6-4 lead. Castillo raced all the way to third when the ball scooted under the glove of Keene's leftfielder, and he scored on senior **Zack Thomas'** (**East Haddam**) two-out pinch single that made it 7-4.

Wojick earned his first collegiate win in relief in the first game. The third of three pitchers, Wojick quelled a Keene threat after being inserted in the seventh while the Owls were scoring two runs and taking a 4-3 lead. Eastern's four-run rally in the bottom of the seventh gave Wojick the lead, and he gained the win in his first decision by shutting out the Owls on three hits over the final two innings.

In his third start of the season, Eastern senior righty **Joe Esposito (East Haven)** departed the first game after six innings in possession of a 3-2 lead, but did not figure in the decision after Keene scored twice in the seventh to take its 4-3 lead. Espositio scattered two hits and only one of the two runs he allowed were earned, but he walked five to go along with five strikeouts.

In the doubleheader, Gilblair had four hits (including his team-leading seventh home run), scored a run and drove in two; Castillo had three hits, walked, scored three runs and drove in three; sophomore leftfielder **John Parke** (**Middlefield**) had three hits and an RBI and Thomas two hits and an RBI.

For Keene in the doubleheader, senior first baseman Joe Rousseau had three hits and a walk, two RBI and two runs scored; junior second baseman James Chevalier had three hits, and Ford contributed two.

Last year, Eastern defeated Keene State five times in six tries: twice in the regular season at Keene, NH and twice in the regional tournament at Harwick, Mass.. The teams split a pair in the conference tournament at the ECSU Baseball Stadium, the Owls forcing a decisive winner-take-all showdown with a 6-3 win before the Warriors won the crown with a 4-3 victory.

Four wild pitches in last two innings hand Western New England victory

SPIRNGFIELD, Mass. The Western New England College baseball team scored the tying and go-ahead runs in the last two innings with the help of four wild pitches as the Golden Bears downed Eastern Connecticut State University, 3-2, Thursday afternoon at Trelease Park.

MANHATTANVILLE BASEBALL SUFFERS FIRST HOME LOSS, 13-3 TO EASTERN CONNECTICUT

PURCHASE, N.Y. - Eastern Connecticut State scored six runs off the Valiant bullpen and the Warriors scored at least three runs in three separate innings, handing Manhattanville their first loss of the season at home, a 13-3 setback Wednesday night at Manhattanville Field.

The Warriors - ranked seventh in the D3Baseball.com National Poll in the preseason - scored a single run in the third then posted three-run fourth and fifth innings to put the game away. Manhattanville's high-powered offense was held to only three runs on nine hits after scoring at least 10 runs in seven of the previous 10 games.

Eastern Connecticut got three straight hits to start the fourth inning off freshman starter Justin Gray (Wappingers Falls, N.Y.), who was making only the second appearance of his college career. The Warriors tagged Gray for three more runs in the fifth inning, highlighted by a two-run double off the bat of Andrew Magliola.

Jimmy Jagodzinski, meanwhile, held Manhattanville to only two hits over the first five frames and kept Manhattanville off the board until the sixth. That's when Stephen Pinto (Yonkers, N.Y.) cracked his second home run in six days to score Paul Blejec (Bronx, N.Y.) who had reached on an infield hit one batter earlier. After playing over two full seasons without a home run, Pinto's newfound power is just part of a breakout season for the centerfielder who leads Manhattanville with a .482 average, 27 hits, 21 runs, 17 RBI and eight stolen bases.

Joe Donnelly (Patterson, N.Y.) relieved Gray to start the sixth inning and was near perfect in his two innings of work, allowing an unearned run without allowing a hit or a walk. Donnelly plunked Jon Dalton with one out in the seventh and the Warrior rightfielder moved up on an error and scored on a groundout.

The Warriors added four more runs in the eighth and one in the ninth to fill their scorecard, with Mike Mooney (Mahopac, N.Y.) scoring an unearned Valiant run in the bottom of the ninth inning.

Mooney was the only Valiant with more than one hit, going 2-for-2 to bump his average up to .400. John Parke went 3-for-4 to lead Eastern Connecticut, and Melvin Castillo belted his third home run for the visitors. Jagodzinski earned the win to improve to 3-1.

REDLANDS, Calif. -- Eastern Connecticut State University sophomore All-America shortstop **Melvin Castillo (Danbury)** contributed to a six-run fourth inning by belting a three-run home run and first-year sophomore righty **Chris Wojick (Uncasville)** stranded the tying and winning runs on base in the ninth as the Warriors edged No. 18 nationally-ranked University of Redlands, 10-9, Friday afternoon at The Park.

Eastern (6-5), which fell out of the national Top 25 this past week after losing three of its first four in California, scored six runs on seven hits and two Redlands (14-9) errors in the top of the fourth inning to move out to a 9-4 lead, but the Bulldogs pulled to within one run (10-9) by scoring four unearned runs in the eighth on just one hit, two Eastern errors, a walk and hit batter.

Wojick, a first-semester transfer from the University of Maine, entered the game with none out, two runs in and a runner aboard in the eighth and Eastern leading 10-7. The hosts scored twice more in the inning on a walk and single to cut Eastern's advantage to 10-9. In the ninth, Wojick left the tying and go-ahead runs aboard, picking a runner off second base for the first out of the inning and getting an infield pop to end the game and record his first save.

Sophomore righty Matt Fontaine (Cranston, RI) gained his first win in second career start. He pitched the first seven innings, allowing seven hits and five runs (three earned) with three strikeouts and no walks and left with a 10-5 lead. Fontaine (1-1) had absorbed an 11-1 loss in his first career start last Saturday against Rutgers-Newark, surrendering seven earned runs before being lifted in the fifth inning.

Freshman righty **Jim Schult (Wappingers Falls, NY)** started the eighth on the mound in place of Fontaine. He faced only three batters – two reaching on errors and one being hit – before giving way to Wojick.

Only six of the 19 runs scored in the game were earned, thanks to ten errors. The Warriors committed six errors which led to six uncarned Redlands runs.

Eastern reached Redlands freshman Steven Dryden (0-1) for nine hits and nine runs in the righty's first career start before driving him from the game during the six-run fourth inning. Only three of the runs allowed by Dryden were earned, however.

Eastern scored its six runs in the fourth on seven hits and two errors. Castillo hit a threerun home run in that inning and senior third baseman **Trey Bongiovanni (Meriden)** had the first and last hits of the inning. Sophomore leftfielder **John Parke (Middlefield)** also had a two-run single in the frame.

Bongiovanni and junior All-America DH Shawn Gilblair (Windham) each had three hits in the game, with senior centerfielder Ismael Bolorin (Manchester), Castillo, junior first baseman Tristan Hobbes (Utica, NY), Parke and junior catcher Andrew Magliola (East Haven) adding two hits each to the 16-hit attack. Castillo drove in four runs, Parke and Gilblair two each. Gilblair had a two-run double to tie the game 3-3 in the second inning and Hobbes had a pinch double and scored in the fourth and later singled and walked in three plate appearances.

The top four hitters in the Eastern lineup – Bolorin, freshman rightfielder **Pat Smith** (**Milford**, **PA**), Castillo, and Gilblair – combined for seven hits, score seven runs, and drive in seven runs. Smith reached four times and scored three runs.

Eastern looks to close out its nine-game California swing with a winning record Saturday when it visits California Lutheran University at 4 p.m ET. The Warriors have won three of their last four to even their spring trip record at 4-4.

EASTERN SNAPS OUT OF THREE-GAME FUNK WITH 21-5 ROUT Bolorin sets the tone with leadoff home run as Warriors blast Whittier College

WHITTIER, Calif. -- Eastern Connecticut State University senior Ismael Bolorin (Manchester) set the tone with a game-opening home run and the Warriors collected nine extra-base hits in a 21-5 rout of Whittier College Tuesday afternoon at Memorial Field on the WC campus.

Eastern (4-4) snapped a three-game losing streak by defeating Whittier for the seventh straight season. The loss ended a four-game winning streak for Whittier (9-9-1), which had won eight of its previous ten and had beaten two teams (Rutgers-Newark and Ithaca College) which had soundly defeated Eastern earlier in the week. Three of the Poets' losses this season – their first three games of the year -- have come at the hands of Chapman University, the No. 1 ranked team in Division III.

Nine players contributed a hit, ten scored a run, and seven drove in at least one for the Warriors, who had seven doubles and two home runs, batted around in scoring five runs in the fourth inning, and reached five pitchers for 18 hits. Making his first start of the season, Whittier senior righty Mark Canner faced only 12 batters before being lifted with two out in the second inning and on the short end of a 5-0 score. Canner was charged with six carned runs on four hits, walked three and hit a batter.

Following Bolorin's leadoff home run, Canner retired the next two batters on fly balls before the Warriors staged a two-out uprising that netted three additional runs. Senior third baseman **Trey Bongiovanni** (**Meriden**) drove in the second run with a single after Canner loaded the bases with a walk, hit batter and single, and first-year sophomore catcher **Chris Wojick** (**Uncasville**) plated two more with a double.

Wojick and freshman utility player Pat Smith (Milford, PA) combined for six hits, nine RBI and three runs scored, while junior All-America Shawn Gilblair (Windham) drove in six runs and scored three with four hits. Among Gilblair's hits was a three-run home run that capped the scoring in the eighth. Wojick and Smith each had two doubles. Wojick was 2-for-4 with five RBI and two runs scored and Smith was 4-for-6 with four RBI and a run scored. Senior second baseman Zack Thomas (East Haddam) and sophomore utility player John Parke (Middlefield) both scored four runs and had two hits.

Now 2-3 in California, Eastern scored in every inning but the ninth, finishing with 21 hits. Leading 7-0, the Warriors scored five runs in the fourth to put the game away.

Junior righty James Kukucka (Vernon) won his second decision this year in as many career stats, combining on a seven-hitter with junior righty Michael Montanari (Newington). Montanari wrapped up the win with a three-inning save.

Thursday, the Warriors face Franklin & Marshall College at 1 p.m. ET and Claremont-Mudd-Scripps Colleges at 5:30 p.m. ET, both games being played at CMS in Claremont, Calif.

SIX-RUN FIRST LIFTS EASTERN BASEBALL, 8-1

In first start, Kukucka credited with first career pitching victory

YAPHANK, N.Y. -- Junior righty James Kukucka (Vernon) won his first game in his first career start and Shawn Gilblair (Windham) and Trey Bongiovanni (Meriden) hit first-inning home runs when the Eastern Connecticut State University baseball team dumped SUNY College at Old Westbury, 8-1, Sunday afternoon at the Baseball Heaven complex.

The game was the final turneup for Eastern (2-1) before it plays nine games in nine days beginning Friday in California. The Warriors have won their last two after opening the season by losing to 2007 national champion Kean University eight days ago. Old Westbury (0-7) was playing its first game since returning from a winless Southern trip against North Carolina Wesleyan and Frostburg State University.

Kukucka (1-0), who was staked to a 6-0 lead before taking the mound, did not allow an earned run over his career-high five-inning sting. He pitched four scoreless innings after giving up an uncarned run in the first on an error, double and two ground balls. He struck out two and hit a batter, but issued no walks in evening his career record at 1-1.

The first four batters in the Eastern lineup had hits and came around to score runs against Old Westbury starter Thomas Butler (0-3), who did not survive the inning. Last year's NCAA Division III Player-of-the-Year as a sophomore designated hitter, Gilblair hit a three-run home run to give Easten a quick 3-0 lead. A senior third baseman, Bongiovanni later added a two-out, two-run shot as the No. 8 hitter in the lineup that chased Butler, who was charged with six earned runs on six hits in two-third of an inning.

Batting second in the order, senior second baseman **Zack Thomas** (**East Haddam**) reached base four times. He doubled in the first run of the game and scored in the first, walked to lead off the the second, singled, stole a base and scored in the fifth, and drove in the final run of the game with a two-out single in the sixth.

Batting leadoff, senior centerfielder Ismael Bolorin (Manchester) scored on two of Thomas' hits, while junior first baseman Tristan Hobbes (Utica, NY) had two hits to move to within six of his 100th career hit. In his first career start, junior rightfielder Andrew Smiley (North Kingstown, RI), singled and scored ahead of Bongiovanni's home run in the first.

In California opener, Warriors swat seven home runs in 25-6 win

CLAREMONT, Calif. -- In a nine-run third inning, junior Shawn Gilblair (Windham) and freshman Andrew Dewing (Swampscott, MA) hit back-to-back home runs and senior Ismael Bolorin (Manchester) later added the team's third home run of the inning as the Eastern Connecticut State University baseball team routed Rutgers University-Camden, 25-6, Friday afternoon in the opening game of its California spring trip in a game played at Bill Arce Field on the Claremont-Mudd-Scripps Colleges campus.

It was the first meeting ever between the two programs.

Eastern (3-1) hit seven home runs in the game – the most ever allowed by Rutgers-Camden (4-3) in a game and two shy of the Eastern game record for home runs in a game. First-year players Travis Bass (West Hartford), Pat Smith (Milford, PA) and Dewing hit their first career home runs. ERRORS COSTLY AS EASTERN BASEBALL DROPS OPENER

Defending champion Kean University scores five unearned runs in 9-2 victory

PISCATAWAY, N.J. -- For the second straight season, the Eastern Connecticut State University baseball team committed five errors in its season-opener, this time falling to 2007 NCAA Division III national champion Kean University, 9-2, Monday afternoon at Bainton Field on the campus of Rutgers University.

Coming off two losses Sunday to unranked Manhattanville College, Kean (2-2) capitalized on five Eastern errors to score five unearned runs and snap the personal nine-game winning streak of Eastern junior righty **Jimmy Jagodzinski (Greenwich)**. Over the first four innings, Jagodzinski (0-1) was charged with five runs – four of which were unearned. The Cougars capitazlized on a throwing error that opening the fourth inning to score three unearned runs and move out to a 5-1 lead, then scored three runs over its final two at-bats to ice the victory.

In last year's season-opener, the Warriors survived five errors to post an 8-4 win over Whittier College in Whittier, Calif.

Senior second baseman Maikel De La Rosa and senior leftfielder Eric Ammirata – the top two hitters in the Kean order – combined for five of their team's 12 hits, and drove in two runs each. Batting leadoff, De La Rosa tripled twice off Jagodzinski and scored both times.

Kean sophomore righty Joe Bartlinski (1-0), who started last year's national championship game (without earning a decision), spaced five hits while fanning 13 and walking only two and gave up both Eastern runs. Junior righty Brandon Aich fanned three more Eastern batters over the final two innings to give the Cougars their second win over the Warriors in the last two years. Last year, Kean spoiled Eastern's home-opener with a 5-3 victory at the ECSU Baseball Stadium. Bartlinksi gained that win, as well, by allowing only one run on five hits in 4 2/3 innings as the second of three Kean pitchers.

None of Eastern's four pitchers in the game walked a batter. Junior righty **James Kukucka (Vernon)** gave up only two hits in three innings after replacing Jagodzinski to start the fifth. In his varsity debut, junior righty **Aaron Henry (Killingly)** allowed a hit in

EASTERN'S GILBLAIR STYMIES STEVENS FOR 20TH CAREER WIN

Junior lefty needs only 28 career appearances to reach baseball milestone

HOBOKEN, N.J. – Junior left-handed pitcher Shawn Gilblair (Windham) pitched six shutout innings in a starting role to achieve his 20th career victory in Eastern Connecticut State University's 9-1 baseball win over Stevens Tech Wednesday afternoon at Dobbelaar Field.

Gilblair (1-0) needed only 28 career appearances (23 starts) to become the 11th pitcher in program history to attain 20 victories. Last year's NCAA Division III National Player-of-the-Year and Little East Conference Pitcher-of-the-Year, Gilblair is 20-3 lifetime with a 1.90 ERA in 175 1/3 innings. He has 172 strikeouts and 23 walks. All but one of his career wins have come in a starting role.

In six innings, Gilblair allowed only three baserunners while fanning eight and walking one. Two runners reached in the first without a hit, but Gilblair fanned two to keep Stevens (2-5) off the board. Gilblair gave up a single to Eddie Daniele leading off the third but the inning ended when Daniele was thrown out trying to score from second on a ground ball to Eastern (1-1) freshman first baseman Andrew Dewing (Swampscott, MA). Gilblair was lifted in favor of sophomore righty Matt Fontaine (Cranston, RI) after striking out the side in the sixth.

In all, three Eastern pitchers combined on a two-hitter, fanned 13 and walked two. In two games this year, Eastern pitchers have now fanned 15 and walked only two.

First-year players collected half of Eastern's 16 hits: first-year sophomore catcher Chris Wojick (Uncasville) and freshmen Dewing, rightfielders Jim Schult (Wappingers Falls, NY), and Andrew Dyer (Topsfield, MA), and third baseman Pat Smith (Milford, PA). Dewing and Schult each had two hits (including one double each), Dewing scoring twice and driving in a run and Schult driving in two runs. They were the first collegiate hits for Dyer, Smith and Wojick. Wojick caught the first eight innings, then closed out the win by fanning one in a 1-2-3 ninth.
