MANSFIELD, Conn. (May 21) – Second-ranked Wheaton College wiped out a two-run deficit in a seven-run seventh inning as the Lyons survived an elimination game for the second straight day with a 9-4 victory over fourth-seeded Eastern Connecticut State University Friday as the Warriors made their earliest departure in the NCAA Division III New England Regional Tournament since 1980.

In defeating Eastern (31-15) for the second time against four losses in regional play in this series, the New England Women's and Men's Athletic Conference (NEWMAC) champion Lyons (34-9) return to action tonight to play the fourth of four games against the winner of Friday's second game between third-seeded Western New England College and eighth-seeded Saint Joseph's College (ME).

Wheaton trailed only once in the game but erased a two-run deficit in the seventh by scoring seven runs on five hits and three walks against four different Eastern pitchers. Tad Skelley, (Wolfeboro, NH) batting ninth, opened the inning with a double to the right-centerfield fence and scored the first run, then stroked a two-run double later in the frame to plate the final two runs and make it 9-4.

Run-scoring singles by Sean Munley (Trenton, NJ) and Eric Jensen (Gorham, NH) in the sixth staked Wheaton to a 2-0 lead before the Warriors ended a 16-inning scoreless streak by scoring their only four runs on four hits and an infield throwing error. The first six batters reached safely or drove in a run in the inning for Eastern. Cleanup hitter Andrew Dewing (Swampscott, MA) tied the game with a sacrifice fly to right and Melvin Castillo (Danbury, CT) gave the Warriors the 3-2 lead with a single to center.

The first six batters of the Wheaton seventh reached safely or drove in a run, with five different batters driving in one run before Skelley capped the surge with his two-out double. Five of the seven runs scored with two out. Eastern pitchers walked seven batters in the game, with four coming around to score.

Wheaton starter Corey Laliberte (Nashua, NH) pitched five scoreless innings but was lifted when the first three Eastern batters reached in the sixth and did not figure in the decision. Laliberte departed with a 2-1 lead but both runners inherited by winning pitcher David Longley (Brunswick, ME) eventually scored.

Eastern starter Jim Schult (Wappingers Falls, NY) carried a 4-2 lead into the seventh but allowed Skelley's leadoff double and walked leadoff hitter Hal Landers (Salem, NH) and was lifted.

## Game 7 - Tufts University (33-5) 3, Eastern Connecticut State University (31-14) 0

MANSFIELD, Conn. -- Playing in the first meeting of 1-0 teams during the NCAA Division III regional, Tufts University got a combined eight-hit shutout performance from junior starter Derek Miller and acc reliever sophomore Chris DeGoti as the top-seeded Jumbos knocked off fourth-seeded Eastern Connecticut State University, 3-0, to improve to 2-0 in the tournament. Tufts will face the winner of the Western New England College vs. University of Massachusetts Boston game in the winner's bracket Friday at 4:30 p.m. Eastern now plays Wheaton College in an elimination game Friday at 10 a.m.

When Tufts and Eastern met April 27 in Medford, Mass., Eastern jumped out to an 8-0 lead before Tufts came to bat in the bottom of the 2<sup>nd</sup> en route to a 19-5 conquest. Today, Tufts got off to an appreciably improved start as the Jumbos drew first blood in the bottom of the 3<sup>rd</sup>, plating three runs off Eastern starter senior **Matt Fontaine (Cranston, RI)**. Using three timely hits and a walk, Tufts took advantage of a senior first baseman Nate Bankoff single to center field to drive in freshman second baseman Frank Petroskey, who had a one-out infield single and stole second. Sophomore third baseman Sam Sager sent a fly ball deep enough into left field to allow junior shortstop David LaResche to tag up and score from third base. LeResche had walked, moved to second on the Bankoff hit and found third base after a wild pitch. Bankoff then scored the third run on a single up the middle by junior right fielder Chase Rose.

In the top of the fourth, the Warriors got a leadoff double from junior first baseman **Andrew Dewing (Swampscott, MA)** and a wild pitch advanced him to third with no outs Miller came up with a gem of a fielding play, snagging a hard, low liner off the bat of senior third baseman **Melvin Castillo (Danbury)** for the first out, then induced a pop up before getting the last out on a strikeout to strand Dewing at third.

Fontaine picked up a key strikeout in the 5th with Tufts runners at second and third, getting Rose on a swinging strike three to end the threat and keep it a three-run deficit. While Tufts held the edge on the scoreboard, both starting pitchers were in relative control through five frames as Miller allowed only three hits while fanning six and Fontaine was touched for just four hits with four strikeouts.

Eastern's greatest scoring opportunity came in the 6th when the Warriors loaded the bases with two outs but again a swinging strikeout came to the rescue for Miller as he got junior **Robert Perry (Manchester)** with a curveball to keep Eastern off the board.

Tufts ace reliever sophomore Chris DeGoti entered the game in the top of the 8th after Miller issued an opening walk. DeGoti retired the first three batters he faced on a strikeout, a fielder's choice grounder and an inning-ending groundout to third base.

DeGoti had a bit more difficulty in the top of the 9th as Eastern got its leadoff batter, Perry, aboard on a walk. He was removed in favor of pinch-runner junior **Joe Cousineau (Newington)**. When pinch-hitter junior **Tyler Turgeon (Norwich)** laced a single into right field, Cousineau went a bit too far past second base and was tagged out 10 feet off the bag after LeResche received the throw from Rose, making it one out with a runner at first. The Warriors still got the tying run to the plate when junior center fielder **Shane Kingsley (Bacon Falls)** was hit by a pitch. But DeGoti went on to record his 12th save of the season as senior second baseman John Parke hit a grounder to Sager at third base for a forceout and DeGoti took care of the final out, fielding a soft grounder to the mound off the bat of senior shortstop **Travis Bass (West Hartford)** and flipping the ball to first to end the contest.

Playing in its 128th game in its 31st NCAA regional appearance, Eastern suffered just its second-ever shutout in regional tournament play, first to a New England opponent. In the New York Regional in 2006, the Warriors were routed, 9-0, by Cortland State in its only previous regional shutout in the second round, but bounced back to beat the Red Dragons twice, 9-5, 10-7 to capture the title.

While Tufts was led by its pitching duo, the Jumbos did get two hits from Bankoff, who scored a run and drove in another. The Warriors, who out-hit the Jumbo, 8-6, got two safeties from Dewing to lead them at the plate. Miller upped his record for the year to 5-0 while Fontaine fell to 6-3.

Eastern has beaten Wheaton four times in five regional tournament meetings, including a 6-2 triumph in the third round of the 2003 regional in the only encounter at the Eastern Baseball Stadium.

Game 1 - Eastern Connecticut St. U. (31-13) 10, Worcester St. College (31-10-1) 4

MANSFIELD, Conn. (May 19) -- Eastern Connecticut State University, as an at-large entry and tournament host playing in its fifth straight NCAA tournament, got a combined six hits, four runs and five RBI from senior shortstop Travis Bass (West Hartford, Conn.) and junior right fielder Jim Schult (Wappinger Falls, N.Y.) to power past MASCAC champion Worcester State College, 10-4, in the opening game of the eight-team NCAA Division III regional tournament here today. The win puts the Warriors in a winner's bracket game Thursday at 4:30 p.m against the winner of the Tufts University vs. St. Joseph's College (Me.) contest. The Lancers face the loser of the Tufts/St. Joe's game in the first elimination contest Thursday at 10 a.m.

Eastern moved out to a five-run lead over Worcester St. in the bottom of the  $4^{th}$ , courtesy of a bases-loaded, three-run double to right center by Bass, pushing the margin to 5-1 after an RBI single to right by junior center fielder Shane Kingsley (Beacon Falls, Conn.) had spotted the Warriors a 2-1 lead in the frame. A single to left from Schult capped the five-run rally for the 6-1 bulge.

The Lancers got a run back in the top of the 5<sup>th</sup> when junior first baseman Nick Fluegge (Ware, Mass.) walked with the bases loaded to plate senior third baseman Ryan LaPrade (Leominster, Mass.), who had led off the inning with a single. A single by senior shortstop TJ Magnell (Leominster, Mass.) and a walk to junior designated hitter Corey McDonald (Hudson, Mass.) filled the sacks. Eastern got out of the situation on a nice running catch in right field by Schult on a liner by junior catcher Johno Hinkell (North Adams, Mass.).

The gap was narrowed to 6-3 when sophomore third baseman Tyler McElman (Marłboro, Mass.) opened the 6<sup>th</sup> with a single to left for the Lancers. Senior right fielder Nick Caparell (North Attleboro, Mass.) sent a line single into right center, sending McElman to third. A ground out by junior center fielder Corey Abbascia (Shrewsbury, Mass.) brought in the Lancers' third run.

Eastern then batted around in the bottom of the 6th to put the game out of reach with a four-run outburst for a 10-3 margin. A two-run single to center field by senior third baseman Melvin Castillo (Danbury, Conn.) made it 8-3 and both junior pinch hitter Robert Perry (Manchester, Conn.) and senior left fielder Chris Thomsen (Montville, Conn.) drove in a run with a hit to give the Warriors their largest lead. Worcester St. starting pitcher senior Joey Lucier (Brockton, Mass.) did not last the inning and was tapped for all 10 runs, nine of them earned, on 11 hits. He suffered the loss, dropping his seasonal record to 7-3. Eastern finished the game with 16 hits.

Going seven innings on the mound for Eastern to get the win was senior Will Musson (Wethersfield, Conn.), who allowed seven hits and three runs, two of them earned. He improved to 6-1 on the year.

Worcester St. had drawn first blood in the top of the 2<sup>nd</sup>, taking advantage of an infield error by Eastern to get LaPrade safely to first base. After a stolen base and move to third base on a ground out, LaPrade hit the plate for the initial run on a ground single up the middle by freshman left fielder Chris Creen (Worcester, Mass).

Eastern responded in the bottom of the 3<sup>rd</sup> with back-to-back doubles by Bass and Schult. Bass sent a roller down the third-base line that hit the bag as he hustled into second base. Schult lashed a ball into the right-center field gap for the RBI.

Worcester St. added the game's final run in the top of the  $9^{th}$  when Fluegge knocked in Magnell, who had walked, with a single to left. Fluegge and McDonald each had a pair of hits for the Lancers, accounting for four of their nine safeties.

While Bass and Schult had three hits apiece for Eastern, the Warriors got a two-hit game from Castillo, Thomsen and junior first baseman Andrew Dewing (Swampscott, Mass.).

## TOP-SEEDED EASTERN BASEBALL OUSTED IN LITTLE EAST

Bid to defeat USM for fourth time in a week fails; Warriors await at-large NCAA berth

MANSFIELD, Conn. – Sweeping a quality opponent in a doubleheader is a difficult task. The Eastern Connecticut State University baseball team did it six days ago against the University of Southern Maine.

Beating that same opponent for a third time is even more difficult. The Warriors did that two days ago in the first round of the Little East Conference Tournament.

Saturday, the Warriors couldn't make it four wins in as many tries this year, falling to the Huskies, 8-7, and falling out of the 2010 Little East Conference Tournament at the Eastern Baseball Stadium.

The winner of last year's tournament for the fifth time in seven years, the Warriors lost twice after winning their first two as fourth-seeded University of Massachusetts Boston completed an unlikely four-game sweep with a 7-3 win over No.6 seed Southern Maine Saturday to win its first conference tournament championship and qualify for its first NCAA Division III.

A seven-time LEC tournament champion, Eastern has never lost the title after reaching the championship round. Its perfect record in title games remained intact after Southern Maine defeated Eastern in the tournament for only the second time in the last nine tournament meetings between the programs.

By ousting Eastern (30-13), Southern Maine advanced to the final, needing two wins over UMass, which had won the battle of tournament unbeatens with a crucial 5-2 triumph over Eastern Friday.

Eastern (30-13) is expected to receive an at-large bid to the NCAA tournament, which would mark its 31<sup>st</sup> NCAA Division III tournament showing (fifth straight) under 42<sup>nd</sup>-year head coach **Bill Holowaty**.

Against Southern Maine, Eastern scored three times in the third and four in the fifth to take a 7-5 lead after USM had scored five times in the first on five hits, two walks and a hit batter. Sophomore No. 9 hitter David Ricker drove in the first run of the fifth with a sacrifice fly, then broke a 7-7 tie with a leadoff home run in the seventh inning for what proved to be the winning run.

Making his post-season debut, freshman righty Benjamin Church (Rochester, MA) was unable to retire a batter. A winner of all four of his decisions this year, Church was the first of five Eastern pitchers in the game, the final four of whom were moderately successful.

Offensively, senior shortstop **Travis Bass (West Hartford)** and junior catcher **Chris Cannata (Southington)** both drove in two runs and junior DH **Steve Cammuso (Rutland, MA)** scored twice. Bass' two-run single highlighted Easterns three-run second and No. 9 hitter Cannata plated two with a two-out double when the Warriors surged ahead with four runs in the fifth on four hits and a USM infield throwing error that made three of the runs unearned.

In Eastern's four tournament games, Cammuso was 8-for-15 with four runs and three RBI; junior first baseman **Andrew Dewing (Swampscott, MA)** 6-for-16 with three runs and two RBI; Bass 5-for-14 with five RBI and five runs scored, an .857 slugging percentage and .550 on-base percentage; senior second baseman **John Parke (Middlefield)** 5-for-14 with six runs and three RBI and a .526 on-base percentage, and senior outfielder **Chris Thomson (Monville)** 6-for-17 with four RBI and three runs. Three of the Warriors top hitters and run-producers batted a combined to hit .146 with seven RBI and three runs scored.

In UMass' milestone championship victory senior lefty Andrew Lebrun won his first game in a month, allowing four hits over the first seven innings, and sophomore tourney MVP Mark McCormack hit a grand slam to highlight a six-run second inning that wiped out a 2-0 Southern Maine (22-21-1) lead for UMass (28-15). LeBrun (3-3), who began his collegiate career at Eastern, pitched six scoreless innings after USM scored twice in the first inning on two hits, a hit batsman and a sacrifice fly. UMass also got a quality outing and pitching win from lefty Mike Andriano, who went eight innings to down the Warriors Friday night for his first victory of the season.

McCormack was 7-for-18 in the tournament with 12 RBI, three home runsand five runs scored.

## ANDRIANO PITCHES UMASS BOSTON BASEBALL PAST EASTERN

Beacons move into LEC tournament finals with 5-2 victory over defending champions

MANSFIELD, Conn. – Senior southpaw **Michael Andriano (Massapequa, NY)** hurled eight-plus innings to earn his first career playoff victory and lead No. 4 seed University of Massachusetts Boston over top-seeded and defending champion Eastern Connecticut State University, 5-2, Friday night in the winners' bracket final of the 2010 Little East Conference baseball tournament at the Eastern Baseball Stadium.

By avenging two regular-season losses at the hands of Eastern (30-12) on this field, UMass (27-15) moves into the tournament's championship round for the first time, receiving two chances to win one game. Eastern faces No. 6 seed University of Southern Maine (21-20-1) Saturday at 11 a.m., with the winner facing UMass at 2:15 p.m. If necessary, a decisive game will be played Sunday at 11 a.m., with the winner earning an automatic bid into the NCAA Division III tournament.

Andriano won his first game in LEC playoff competition and earned his first victory this season after three losses in helping the Beacons to their tenth win in their last 12 outings. Eight of the nine hits he allowed were singles and six of his nine strikeouts were called, including the gameending against pinch hitter **Robert Perry (Manchester)**, who represented the tying run.

Eastern senior righty Matt Fontaine (Cranston, RI) fanned eight and allowed only seven hits before being lifted with one out in the seventh. The Warriors staked Fontaine (6-2) to a 1-0 lead in the first when the first three batters reached on singles. Andriano, however, never gave up more than one hit in an inning after that until the seventh.

Eastern looked like it would break up the game early by loading the bases with its first three hitters reaching and senior third baseman Melvin Castillo (Danbury, CT) at the plate, but could only come up with a run when Castillo hit a hard ground ball to third where UMass Boston sophomore third baseman Mike Mattei (Spencer, MA) handled the play, stepped on third and threw home, but hit the junior right fielder Shane Kingsley (Beacon Falls, CT) in the back. Andriano struck out the next hitter and got a harmless fly out to center to get out of trouble. Kingsley, senior shortstop Travis Bass (West Hartford, CT) and junior first baseman Andrew Dewing (Swampscott, MA) collected successive singles to open the frame and load the bases.

UMass Boston pulled even, but might have had more in the third. Junior right fielder Jose Roman Santos (Tenares, Dominican Republic) started the frame with a single to left and freshman shortstop Matt Consiglio (Southbury, CT) was brushed by a pitch to put runners on first and second. Senior left fielder Drew Tambling (Sterling, MA) moved the runners into

scoring position with a sacrifice bunt and sophomore center fielder Mark McCormack (Shelton, CT) followed with a sacrifice fly to right field to score Santos with the tying run, but Consiglio also tagged and then was called out for leaving the base early on the play to end the inning.

The Beacons took their first lead of the night when junior second baseman **Ryan Walsh** (**Newton, MA**) crushed the first pitch he saw over the left field wall for his eighth home run of the season and a 2-1 edge. The four-bagger gave him 282 career total bases to break the school record held by Adam Waxman (2000-03).

UMass Boston tacked on single runs in the sixth, seventh and eighth innings to take a 5-1 margin. Walsh beat out an infield single to shortstop, stole second, stole third and came around to score on a sacrifice fly to center field by junior first baseman Connor Reinfurt (Manchester, NH) for a 3-1 lead in the sixth. Mattei reached on an infield single to third to lead off the seventh, stole second and advanced to third on an errant throw by the Warriors' catcher, where he scored on a one-out RBI single to left by Consiglio to give the Beacons a 4-1 margin. Tambling followed with a single through the right side to knock out Eastern Connecticut senior starting pitcher Matt Fontaine (Cranston, RI) and bring in junior lefty reliever Bill Roveto (South Windsor, CT), who got the left-handed McCormack to hit into an inning ending double play. Senior reliever Chris Wojick (Uncasville, CT) came on for the eighth and junior catcher Tim Fontaine (Worcester, MA) drew a one-out walk, moved to second on a ground out and scored on a Mattei single to right field for a 5-1 lead.

The Warriors got a run back in the eighth when senior second baseman John Parke (Middlefield, CT) smacked a leadoff double, stole third with one out and just beat the throw at home on a sacrifice fly to center off the bat of junior Jim Schult (Wappingers Falls, NT) to make it 5-2. Eastern Connecticut threatened in the ninth when Kingsley drew a leadoff walk. UMass Boston junior closer Tony Damon (San Bruno, CA) came into the game and walked Bass after a full count to bring the tying run to the plate. A fly out and a pair of strikeouts later gave the Beacons the victory and Damon his second save of the day and fifth of the season.

Heading into this year's tournament, UMass was 4-11all-time against the other five teams in the tournament. Eastern has won seven tournament titles, five of them coming in the last seven years.

## RHODE ISLAND ELIMINATED IN LITTLE EAST TOURNAMENT

Third-seeded Anchormen eliminated in two games after 9-3 loss to No. 1 Eastern Conn.

MANSFIELD, Conn. - **John Parke (Middlefield, CT)** hit a three-run home run to highlight a five-run fifth inning that snapped a tie and sparked top-seeded Eastern Connecticut State University to a 9-3 victory that eliminated third-seeded Rhode Island College from the 2010 Little East Conference baseball tournament Friday morning at the Eastern Baseball Stadium.

Rhode Island (21-18) ends its season with losses in 11 of its last 15 games while defending tournament champion Eastern (30-11-1) moved into a winners bracket game at 8:30 p.m. Friday night against fourth-seeded UMass Boston. The Warriors have now won at least 30 games for ten straight season and for the 26<sup>th</sup> time under 42<sup>nd</sup>-year head coach **Bill Holowaty**.

Travis Bass (West Hartford, CT) tied the game for Eastern by belting a solo home run in the third – his third home run in four games after failing to hit one to that point. Parke then unloaded his fourth of the season when the Warriors batted around and scored five times in the fifth to take a 6-2 lead. Batting ninth, Steve Cammuso (Rutland, MA) socked his second home run of the season – one of his three hits in the game – a two-run shot in the eighth.

Rhode Island collected 11 hits off winning pitcher Jim Schult (Wappingers Falls, NY)— who won his fifth straight decision after an opening loss – and Evan Chamberlain (Hebron, CT) but the Anchormen stranded 11 runners.

Rhode Island took a 1-0 lead in the second on a leadoff double by **Gary Levesque (East Providence, RI)** and single with none out by **Tim Schabowski (Pascoag, RI)**. Schabowski moved to third on consecutive wild pitches but was stranded there by Schult, who worked out of the jam by getting a line drive to right, a strikeout and ground ball to short.

The Anchormen stranded two runners in the third and left runners on second and third in the fourth after scoring a run when **Kyle Allaire** (**Uxbridge**, **MA**) lined out to Parke at second. With two out in the fifth, RIC scored again but left a runner at third when Schult picked off a runner at first to end the fifth. Trailing 6-3, RIC left two more aboard in the seventh when Schult induced an inning-ending fly ball with runners at first and third.

Cammuso had three hits, scored two runs and drove in two while Parke finished with three RBI on his home run and Bass had two hits and scored three runs.

Ronnie Bracchi (Wappingers Falls, NY) had three hits for Rhode Island, Levesque and Kevin Carey (Wakefield, RI) picking up two each.

## TOP-SEEDED EASTERN BASEBALL ADVANCES IN LEC TOURNEY

Thomson homers and drives in four runs in 10-2 victory over No. 6 Southern Maine

MANSFIELD, Conn. -- Chris Thomson (Montville, CT) triple and homered and drove in four runs to highlight a 15-hit attack as No. 1-seeded and defending champion Eastern Connecticut State University downed No. 6 University of Southern Maine, 10-2, in the opening game of the 2010 Little East Conference baseball tournament Thursday at the Eastern Baseball Stadium.

Ranked 16<sup>th</sup> nationally, Eastern (29-11) scored four times in the bottom of the first inning and after Southern Maine (19-20-1), then tacked on four more in the eighth to break the game open. Eastern senior righty **Will Musson (Wethersfield, CT)** allowed nine hits and both Southern Maine runs over the first eight innings to post his fifth win against a loss this year. The win was Eastern's third in four days over the Huskies. This past Sunday, Eastern swept USM at Gorham, ME to earn the tournament's No. 1 seed.

Travis Bass (West Hartford, CT) hit a two-run home run in the first inning and Thomson, batting seventh, Thomson tripled in Eastern's final run of the inning. Thomson also had an RBI single in the seventh and belted a two-run home run in the eighth.

Southern Maine lefty Mark Schmidt (Gorham, ME) was lifted after facing only four batters, the first three of who reached safely and scored in the first. Musson struck out three and walked two in bouncing back from his only loss of the season in his most recent start May 6 at Wheaton College.

Batting ninth in the order, Eastern's **Steve Cammuso** (**Rutland**, **MA**) matched Thomson with three hits for Eastern while **Melvin Castillo** (**Danbury**, **CT**) drove in two runs with a single in the sixth and a triple in the eighth. The Huskies got six hits but no RBI and only one run scored from its top two hitters in the lineup, **Tucker White** (**Deerfield**, **NH**) and **Anthony Pisani** (**Cheshire**, **CT**), **Nick Grady** (**Whitefield**, **ME**) drove in two runs with two hits. He singled in USM's two runs in the eighth.

In the LEC tournament, Eastern leads the series against Southern Maine, 9-5, having won nine of the last 11 after the Huskies won the first three. Southern Maine has won only two of its last ten games (2-7-1). Last year's top tournament seed, Southern Maine is looking for its first LEC tournament championship since 1999.

# EASTERN BASEBALL SWEEPS USM, GAINS NO. 1 LEC TOURNAMENT SEED Warriors finish with piece of Little East regular-season title for tenth time in 14 years

GORHAM, Maine – The Eastern Connecticut State University baseball team will host the 2010 Little East Conference Tournament after sweeping the University of Southern Maine, 21-1 and 12-9 Sunday afternoon at the USM Baseball Stadium. The first game was stopped after seven innings.

The sweep gives Eastern (28-11, 10-4 little east) at least a share of its tenth LEC regular-season title in the 14 years of LEC baseball competition. Ranked No. 16 nationally, Eastern shares the regular-season title with Keene State College and was awarded the No. 1 seed due to tie-breakers. The six-team double-elimination tournament runs Wednesday through Saturday at the Eastern Baseball Stadium. Eastern meets No. 6 seed Southern Maine (19-19-1, 6-8 little east)) Wednesday at noon in the first of three first-round games.

Eastern needed to win both games against Southern Maine in order to nail down the No. 1 seed and hosting privileges. Southern Maine won only two of its final nine regular-season games (2-6-1). The Huskies have won or shared five LEC regular-season titles, including the 2009 crown. They have captured two LEC tournament titles, the last coming in 1999. Eastern is the defending conference tournament champion, winning its fifth crown in the last seven years last spring.

NORTON, Mass. -- - In a match-up of nationally-ranked teams, Wheaton College senior Nick Kostaras carried a one-hit shutout against Eastern Connecticut State University into the seventh inning, as he and four relievers bottled up one of the nation's top offenses during a 7-3 win on Thursday in Sidell Stadium.

In their final home game of the year, the 30th-ranked Lyons improved to 31-8 while giving head coach **Eric Podbelski** his 399th career win. The 16th-ranked Warriors (26-11) had beaten Wheaton the previous two times the programs had met. as Wheaton moved to 4-0 at home in the all-time series. Eastern is ranked fourth in New England, Wheaton second.

NORTH DARTMOUTH, Mass. - Senior righty **Matt Fontaine (Cranston, RI)** threw his first complete game in more than two years - allowing only one earned run - as the Eastern Connecticut State University baseball team maintained a share of first place in the Little East Conference with a 5-4 victory over the University of Masschusetts Dartmouth Saturday afternoon in the second game of a doubleheader at the UMD Athletic Complex

In the first game, UMass Dartmouth's (19-15, 7-5 little east) Matt Ryan hit a game-tying, two-run home run with no one out in the bottom of the ninth inning after the first batter was hit by a pitch to force extra innings, and Anthony Fiorita ended the game with one out in the bottom of the 11th inning with an RBI single after going 0-for-5 in the game and failing to get the ball out of the infield in the hosts' 6-5 triumph. The UMass first-game win snapped Eastern's (26-9, 8-4 little east) six-game winning streak.

With two games conference remaining, Keene State College pulled into a tie with Eastern atop the conference standings by sweeping defending regular-season champion University of Southern Maine, 12-10 and 12-6 at Keene, NH. Next Saturday, Eastern visits Southern Maine and Keene hosts UMass Dartmouth in doubleheaders on the final day of the regular season. The regular-season champion hosts the six-team LEC double-elimination tournament May 12-16.

Fontaine, now 16-4 in the career, scattered six hits while fanning six and walking three to gain his fifth win in six decisions this year and pitch his first complete game since shutting out Western Connecticut 5-0 April 5, 2008. Ranked fourth in New England and No. 2 in Division III, Eastern (23-8, 7-3 little east) gains at least a share of first place in the conference. #### WELL-RESTED MUSSON SHUTS DOWN TRINITY, 8-1

Warriors win confrontation of nationally-ranked baseball teams

MANSFIELD, Conn. – Senior righty **Will Musson (Wethersfield)** avenged his only collegiate pitching loss by striking out a career-tying 13 batters to spark the Eastern Connecticut State University baseball team to an 8-1 win over Trinity College Tuesday night at the Eastern Baseball Stadium.

The game was the first between the programs since Trinity (20-8) won the 2009 New England championship with a 5-4 win over Eastern (14-7) at the Eastern Baseball Stadium. In that game, Musson pitched seven strong innings three days after a route-going performance against Suffolk University, but was saddled with his first loss after nine straight wins.

With ten days rest this time, the 6-foot-1 inch, 225-pounder overmatched the Bantams by equaling his career high with 13 strikeouts. He gave only one run on three hits, three walks, and one hit batsman. The 2008 national champion, Trinity hurt its own cause by committing three errors, with five pitchers allowing nine hits, walking nine, hitting four batters and balking once.

The two nationally-ranked teams had both lost two straight entering the game, the Bantams being swept by Tufts University and Eastern dropping the second game of a Little East Conference doubleheader to Plymouth State and an 11-9 decision Monday against visiting Suffolk University.

Eastern threatened in every inning, putting runners on base in all eight at-bats. The Warriors batted around in their first at-bat, scoring three times on singles junior rightfielder Jim Schult (Wappingers Falls, NY) and junior first baseman Andrew Dewing (Swampscott, MA) and earning four walks. Trinity freshman righty D.J. Goldberg faced only eight batters, getting the hook after walking in the third run of the game. Another single by Schult and three more walks made it 4-0 in the second and Eastern boosted thelead to 7-0 in the fourth when Dewing smacked a two-run opposite-field home run to right and No. 9 hitter Chris Cannata (Southington) poked an RBI single to center.

Musson (3-0) departed on the long end of an 8-1 lead, which was protected by junior lefty **Bill Roveto** (**South Windsor**). Roveto recorded the final six outs, giving up only one hit and fanning the final two batters. In a four-year pitching career, Musson is 15-1. He was 3-0 in two seasons at the University of Connecticut and 12-1 at Eastern.

Schult had three hits and Dewing three RBI to improve his team lead in that category to 43. Senior shortstop **Travis Bass (West Hartford)** walked three times and senior third baseman **Melvin Castillo (Danbury)** reached four times with two hits and two walks and scored twice. Senior outfielder **Chris Thomson (Monville)** reached safely in his first four plate appearances with two walks, a hit-by-pitch and a sixth-inning leadoff triple which extended his hitting streak to 13. He scored two runs.

Thomson has five hits, seven RBI in opener; hosts can't rally in Game 2

MANSFIELD, Conn. - Senior outfielder **Chris Thomson** (**Montville**) went 5-for-5 with two doubles, a triple and seven RBI to lead the Eastern Connecticut State University baseball team to a 13-2 first-game victory over Plymouth State University and an eventual split of a Little East Conference doubleheader Sunday afternoon at the Mansfield Outdoor Complex.

In the second game, Plymouth (5-18, 1-6 little east) built a 5-0 lead and held on for a 5-4 win over Eastern (19-7, 5-3 little east) to end a 19-game losing sreak at the hands of the Warriors. The first game was stopped due to the ten-run rule.

Thomson, a second-year transfer, had a leadoff double in the third inning of the first game, tripled in three runs with two out in the fourth that gave the Warriors the lead for good (3-2), reached on an infield single to shortstop in the sixth, doubled home two runs in a five-run seventh and singled in two runs in a four-run eighth. His hit total was one shy of the Eastern single-game record and RBI total three shy of the single-game RBI mark. Thomson also singled in his final at-bat in the second game to extend his hitting streak to 11. He improved his season batting average to .500 (33-for-66) after the first game.

Junior righty **Jim Schult (Wappingers Falls, NY)** pitched at least seven innings for the third straight start in the opener, winning his third (straight) decision. He did not allow an earned run over seven innings, giving up four hits while fanning three and walking two.

Schult also scored three runs and drove in two runs with two doubles to back his strong pitching in the opener. Senior All-America infielder **Melvin Castillo** (**Danbury**) also had two hits, three runs and two RBI in the first win which extended the Warriors' winning streak to five.

In the second game, senior lefties **Mike Tingley (Rockville)** and **Wes Dutton (Waterbury)** combined on 5 1/3 innings of scoreless, three-hit relief with eight strikeouts and no walks (Dutton also picked off two runners), but Eastern ran itself out of two potentially big innings with baserunning blunders as the Panthers defeated Eastern for the first time in nine years.

Sophomore first baseman Matt Cappiello and junior shortstop Grant Livingston both drove in two runs for Plymouth in the nightcap with two-run singles to power the Panthers to a 5-0 lead after three innings. In the fourth, Eastern scored twice on a hit and two walks, then added two more runs in the fifth on an infield ground out by Thomson and an RBI double by junior outfielder **Shane Kingsley** (**Beacons** 

Falls). The Warriors had a baserunner ruled out in the fourth for missing first on an apparent RBI triple, then had a baserunner hung up and tagged out at third on an apparent game-tying single by junior outfielder Andrew Dyer (Topsfield, MA).

Junior lefty Bryant Lausberg was credited with the second-game win in relief of junior lefty starter John Andersch. Lausberg took over for Lausberg with a 2-2 count on Castillo in the two-run Eastern fifth. He was charged with both runs in the fifth but faced only 15 batters over the final four innings, allowing three hits and a walk.

## CASTILLO, DEWING HOMER IN EASTERN BASEBALL'S 7-4 VICTORY

First-year sophomore pitcher Mitch Furber hurls six strong innings to gain win

MANSFIELD, Conn. – Senior outfielder **Chris Thomson (Montville)** continued his torrid hitting and extended his hitting streak to nine and senior All-America infielder **Melvin Castillo (Danbury)** and junior first baseman **Andrew Dewing (Swampscott, MA)** each hit two-run home runs to power the Eastern Connecticut State University baseball team to a 7-4 victory over Bridgewater State College Wednesday afternoon at the Eastern Baseball Stadium.

The win is the fourth straight and eighth in 11 games for Eastern (18-6) since returning from Arizona and is the Warriors' ninth triumph in the last 11 meetings with Bridgewater (12-10). The Warriors have won six of their last seven home games since giving away their home-opener to Western Connecticut 12 days ago. Since returning from a 5-2 trip to Florida, the Bears are 7-8.

First-year sophomore right-handed pitcher **Mitch Furber (Montville)** allowed three runs over the first six innings in his second start to earn his second win in as many decisions. He allowed only one run through the first six innings before departing after giving up hits to the first two batters of the sixth. After the Bears closed the gap to 5-4 by scoring three runs in the seventh, junior righty **Andrew Morrison (Old Saybrook)** left the tying run aboard by getting an inningending ground ball, then got the final six outs to record his first career save. Morrison gave up a leadoff single in the eighth, but junior catcher **Chris Cannata (Southington)** gunned down Jake Roderick trying to steal second.

Clinging to their slim one-run lead, the Warriors scored two key insurance runs in the eighth after there were two out and none on. Thomson singled and junior No. 8 hitter **Joe Cousineau** (Newington) doubled and after a walk loaded the bases, senior leadoff hitter **John Parke** (Middlefield) singled them in.

The program's all-time home run leader, Castillo hit a two-run home run – the 42<sup>nd</sup> of his career – to give Eastern the lead for good in the bottom of the first, 2-1, and Dewing added a two-run shot in the fourth to make it 4-1. The home run was the third of the season for both of them.

The Little East Conference Player-of-the-Week last week, Thomson is batting .586 (17-for-29) during the nine-game hitting streak and has six multiple-hit games in the last seven.

No. 3 hitter Matt Greenberg had two hits and two RBI for Bridgewater and Roderick had three hits. Leadoff hitter Brian Medairos and Greenberg doubled off Furber in the first inning to give the Bears a 1-0 lead but Furber retired nine of the next ten batters.

BABSON PARK, Mass. – Freshman righty **Benjamin Church (Rochester, MA)** scattered four hits over the first five innings and the top five hitters in the Eastern Connecticut State University order combined for eight hits, scored five runs and drove in five as the Warriors downed Babson College, 7-5, Monday afternoon at Govoni Field.

The win is the fifth in the last six games for Eastern (17-6). The contest was a rematch of the opening round of the 2009 New England Baseball Tournament Regionals, won by Babson (17-8). Since earning New England's top ranking a week ago, Babson has dropped five of seven. The Warriors are rated in a tie for fifth and Babson seventh in the third weekly New England poll, released today.

Church (3-0), announced as the Little East Conference Rookie-of-the-Week today for his pitching last week, stranded five Babson runners over the first two innings to help the Warriors eventually move out to leads of 3-0 and 6-2. In winning his second straight start and third in four starts on the season, Church allowed three singles and a double and walked six with four strikeouts.

After Eastern scored an unearned run in the second, Church walked three batters in the second but stranded the bases loaded by getting No. 2 hitter Billy Miller on an inning-ending fly ball to junior rightfielder Jim Schult (Wappingers Falls, NY). ## SCHULT PITCHES, HITS EASTERN BASEBALL PAST WESTERN

Junior righty throws complete-game two-hitter, drives in four runs with four hits

DANBURY, Conn. – Nine days ago, Eastern Connecticut State University junior **Jim Schult (Wappingers Falls, NY)** came away empty-handed after pitching into the ninth inning of a teninning Little East Conference loss to Western Connecticut State University at the Eastern Baseball Stadium.

Sunday at Westside Field, he brought his bat along, just for good measure, and pitched and hit the Warriors to an 11-1 victory over the Colonials in a game stopped after seven innings due to the conference's ten-run rule.

On the mound, the right-handed Schult pitched a complete-game two-hitter without allowing an earned run. At bat, he was 4-for-4 with four RBI and two runs scored. Included in his hits were his team-leading sixth home run of the season – a two-run blast in a three-run third that pushed Eastern's (16-6, 4-2 little east) lead to 6-0. He also had an RBI single in a three-run first and an RBI single in a four-run fourth and doubled and scored the only run of the sixth.

The complete game was the second in 13 career starts for Schult, who fanned eight and walkd three. The only hits he surrendered were a two-out single in the first and a leadoff single in the sixth. He retired seven in a row after walking in Western's (8-11, 2-4 little east) only run in the third.

Eastern senior leftfielder **Chris Thomson (Montville)** collected at least two hits for the fifth straight game, improving his hitting over those games to .750 (12-for-18) with nine RBI and seven runs and pulling into a tie for the team batting lead with an overall .463 average. Thomson reached safely in all four plate appearances. He was hit by pitch in the first, hit a solo home run – his fourth in the last six games – in the third, and singled runs in the fourth and sixth.

Batting ninth, sophomore catcher **Steve Cammuso (Rutland, MA)** also had two hits in Eastern's 12-hit attack and also reached on a hit-by-pitch.
