RHODE ISLAND SECURES FIRST LITTLE EAST BASEBALL TITLE

Anchormen sweep field to reach NCAA tournament for first time since 1980

MANSFIELD, Conn. – The fifth-seeded Rhode Island College baseball team completed an improbable sweep of the top four seeds with a 6-3 win over fourth-seeded Western Connecticut State College in the title game of the 2005 Little East Conference Tournament Saturday afternoon at the Eastern Baseball Stadium.

By winning its first conference tournament title in the nine-year history of the event, Rhode Island (19-19) qualifies automatically for the NCAA tournament. It will be its first NCAA appearance since reaching the tournament three straight seasons through 1980.

Needing two wins over Rhode Island to win its second tournament title in four years, Western (18-22) scored the first run of the game in the top of the first inning but the Anchormen took the lead for good with two in the bottom of the inning and rode the five-hit pitching of senior righty **James Milano (JOHNSON, RI)** to its fourth straight tournament victory. Rhode Island opened the tournament by besting second-seeded Keene State College, 8-3, and defeated third-seeded University of Southern Maine, 7-4 before eliminating two-time defending champion and top seed Eastern Connecticut State university, 6-3 Friday night.

A winner of only one of six decisions during the regular season, Milano gave his team its fourth quality start of the tournament. He took a 6-1 lead into the sixth inning before walking two and giving up two hits as the Colonials rallied to close the gap to 6-3. Making his second tournament appearance, freshman righty Eric Fama (WAPPINGERS FALLS, NY) came on at that point to face the tying run but got a ground ball to end the inning. Fama earned the staff's second save. Rhode Island starters also pitched two complete games.

Freshman rightfielder **Robert Doyon** (**DOUGLAS**, **MA**) was 3-for-4 with three RBI and two runs scored in the title game to earn tournament Most Outstanding Player honors. EASTERN BASEBALL SURVIVES IN LITTLE EAST TOURNAMENT Warriors squander early lead, score four unearned runs in 9-5 win over USM

MANSFIELD, CT – The top-seeded Eastern Connecticut State University baseball team scored four unearned run in the top of the eighth inning and went on to a 9-5 win over third-seeded University of Southern Maine in an elimination game of the 2005 Little East Conference Tournament Friday afternoon at the Eastern Baseball Stadium on the Eastern Connecticut State University campus.

The win gives two-time defending tournament champion Eastern (30-12) its fifth straight 30-win season and keeps the Warriors alive in the original six-team, double-elimination field. Eastern, which has won its last three over Southern Maine (25-14) in this tournament, was scheduled to face fifth-seeded Rhode Island College (17-19) Friday night at 7 p.m. Southern Maine, which lost to Eastern in last year's championship round, is eliminated after losing two of three in the tournament.

Eastern never trailed in the game but squandered leads of 4-0 after three innings and 5-4 after six innings. With the score tied 5-5, the Warriors scored four unearned runs with two out in the eighth inning. With the bases loaded and the score tied, **Zach Mehrbach** (**LYME**, **NH**) grounded a potential inning-ending ground ball to short, but the flip to second base was dropped as two runs scored. **Marc Garofalo** (**SOUTH KINGSTOWN**, **RI**) then had his second two-run hit of the day when he doubled into the left-center field gap to make it 9-5.

Garofalo's two-run triple on the first pitch from reliever **Tip Fairchild (MONMOUTH, ME)** highlighted a four-run first inning for Eastern but the Huskies came back to tie the game with four runs in the bottom of the fourth on five hits, a walk and hit-by-pitch. The Huskies chased Eastern freshman starter **Joe Esposito (EAST HAVEN, CT)** when they batted around in the inning. Two singles and a walk loaded the bases and No. 9 hitter **Joe Ganley (KEENE, NH)** drove in the first run with a single to center. Esposito, who had

worked into the eighth inning in Eastern's 20-5 win over Southern Maine during the regular season, then hit leadoff hitter Nick Vardaro (NORWOOD, MA) to force in the second run and Ryan Bourque's (SANFORD, ME) two-run double down the right field line tied the game at 4-4.

A leadoff double by Mehrbach and Leon Galemba's (FAIRFIELD, CT) RBI single pushed Eastern ahead again in the fifth.but the Huskies tied the game in the seventh when freshman Eddie Skeffington (EVERETT, MA) doubled with one out and scored on Fairchild's two-out single.

Eastern redshirt freshman Trey Bongiovanni (MERIDEN, CT) and senior Ben O'Brien (MONTVILLE, CT) combined to work the final 5 2/3 innings, allowing only one run on seven hits. Bongiovanni was called upon after Bourque's two-run double in the fourth. With runners on second and third, Bongiovanni kept the score tied by getting a strikeout and fly ball to right to end the inning.

Eastern's top five hitters in the lineup combined for 11 hits, eight runs and six RBI. Garofalo was 3-for-5 with four RBI and a run scored. Mehrbach scored three runs, leadoff hitter Jason Pekrul (BERLIN, CT) was 3-for-4 with two runs scored and Tom Koch (WARWICK, RI) was 2-for-4 with two runs and an RBI.

Skeffington led Southern Maine with four hits, Fairchild and freshman Rich McGraw (SIMSBURY, CT) picking up two hits each.

WESTERN BASEBALL MOVES INTO LEC TOURNEY TITLE ROUND

Colonials blast Massachusetts Boston, 9-2; will play at noon on Saturday

MANSFIELD, CT – T.J. Tarantino (RUTHERFORD, NJ) drove in four runs with a first-inning single and sixth-inning home run to power the fourth-seeded Western Connecticut State University baseball team to a 9-2 win over sixth-seeded University of Massachusetts Boston Friday afternoon in the 2005 Little East Conference Tournament at the Eastern Baseball Stadium on the Eastern Connecticut State University campus.

With its second straight tournament win after an opening loss, Western (18-21) moves into the championship round of the tournament and will face either top-seeded Eastern Connecticut State University or fifth-seeded Rhode Island College Saturday at noon. Coming off its first tournament win ever Thursday, UMass (17-22) is eliminated from the tournament with a 1-2 record.

Two-time defending tournament champion Eastern faces undefeated Rhode Island College tonight at 7:30 p.m. A Rhode Island win would eliminate once-beaten Eastern and leave the Anchormen as the only unbeaten team in the tournament. The Anchormen would then have two chances against Western to win its first tournament title. An Eastern win against Rhode Island would move the Warriors into a 4 p.m. championship game and drop the Anchormen into a noon elimination game against Western. Eastern would face the Rhode Island-Western winner for the tournament title.

Western, which lost twice to UMass Tuesday night in the regular season finale here, scored three runs in the first and three in the third to move out to a 6-1 lead. The Colonials rode the seven-hit pitching of freshman Jamie Garland (EAST MEADOW, NY), who earned his first career win after three losses.

Trailing 1-0, Western scored three runs in the bottom of the first inning on Adam Kaplan's (STRATFORD, CT) RBI single and Tarantino's two-out, two-run single. The Colonials added three more in the third to make it 6-1 on two-out run-scoring hits by No. 8 hitter Dennis Barrett (STATEN ISLAND, NY) and No. 9 hitter Kevin Darcey (LEVITTOWN, NY).

Four UMass pitchers combined to give up 14 hits, walk nine and hit two batters. Six batters who reached either by walk or hit-by-pitch scored, including all three in the third inning.

Western's 2-through-6 batters each had two hits. In addition to four RBI, Tarantino had two hits and scored two runs. Adam Kaplan was 2-for-3 with three runs scored and an RBI and No. 3 hitter **Eben McKnight (WINDSOR, CT)** was 2-for-4 with two runs scored. Darcey had three hits and drove in a run.

In his fourth career start, Garland fanned two and walked four in pitching the first seven innings.

THIBAULT'S FIVE-HITTER LEADS RIC INTO LEC TOURNAMENT FINALS

Freshman stymies No. 1 seed Eastern Conn. as Anchormen eliminate Warriors, 6-3

MANSFIELD, CT – Freshman righty **Eric Thibault (SOMERSET, MA)** pitched a complete-game five-hitter as the fifth-seeded Rhode Island College baseball team eliminated top-seeded Eastern Connecticut State University, 6-3 Friday night to move to within one win of capturing its first Little East Conference Tournament title at the Eastern Baseball Stadium.

The win is the third without a loss in the tournament for Rhode Island (18-19), which has two chances to defeat fourth-seeded Western Connecticut State University (18-21) Saturday to claim the title. The championship round gets underway at noon.

Western remained alive in the double-elimination tournament Friday afternoon by eliminating sixth-seeded University of Massachusetts Boston, 9-2. The win was the second straight for the Colonials after an opening 4-2 loss to third-seeded University of Southern Maine. As the No. 3 seed, Western won the 2002 tournament title, defeating Southern Maine here in the final.

Thibault (4-2), who was roughed up in a relief role in Rhode Island's 12-0 loss to Eastern April 30, was staked to a 5-0 lead after two innings. Although three of the hits he allowed went for extra bases, he never gave up more than one hit in an inning. He fanned eight and walked two in posting his fourth complete game in seven starts.

The Anchormen scored three runs in the top of the first against three Eastern pitchers after there were two out and no one on base, and added two more runs in the second inning. Freshman Robert Doyon (DOUGLAS, MA) drove in two runs in the first with a double to right-center while Jim Connell (SMITHFIELD, RI) and and No. 4 hitter Matt Brannon (CRANSTON, RI) each drove in a run with singles to help the Anchormen to the 5-0 lead.

Brannon, who saved his team's 7-4 win over Southern Maine Thursday night, had three hits, as did No. 8 hitter Chris Smaldone (JOHNSON, RI).

In reaching the final, Rhode Island has defeated the top three tournament seeds in Eastern, No. 2 Keene State and Southern Maine. During the regular season, Rhode Island was swept by Eastern and Southern Maine and swept Keene State.

Entering the tournament, the Anchormen had lost nine of 12 games in five years of conference tournament play, with only one of their wins coming in the double-elimination portion of the tournament. They were eliminated in two straight in 2003 and 2004 and did qualify in 2001 and 2002. Prior to 2005, the Anchormen had lost 20 of 21 conference games against Eastern, including both playoff games.

UMASS BOSTON BASEBALL WINS FIRST LITTLE EAST TOURNEY GAME Behind Tardugno's complete game, Beacons eliminate No. 2 seed Keene State

MANSFIELD, CT – Sophomore righty Evan Tardugno (METHUEN, MA) pitched his fifth complete game of the season and Pat Donovan (LOWELL, MA) drove in three runs as sixth-seeded University of Massachusetts Boston eliminated second-seeded Keene State College from the 2005 Little East Conference Baseball Tournament Thursday afternoon, 6-0, at the Eastern Baseball Stadium.

The win is the first-ever for UMass (17-21) in the nine-year history of the tournament and advances the Beacons to play Friday at 3:30 p.m. against an undetermined opponent.

The Beacons were making their first-ever trip to the double-elimination portion of the tournament after losing play-in games three times previously. Keene (22-15), which had earned its highest seed ever in this tournament, had swept UMass Boston during the regular season.

A winner of four of its last six after snapping a six-game losing streak, UMass broke from a one-run lead by scoring three times in the bottom of the sixth and twice in the bottom of the seventh. Donovan, the losing pitcher in Wednesday's loss to top-seeded Eastern Connecticut State University, drove in a run in the sixth with a single and plated both runs in the seventh with a two-out double. He took over the team lead from Tardugno with 33 RBI.

In recording his first shutout of the year, Tardugno allowed ten hits and walked two but helped himself by picking four Keene State runners off base: two at third base, one at second and one at first. In a scoreless game, Tardugno picked a runner off third to end the second and picked a runner off second for the second out of the third. He also picked a runner off third for the second out of the fifth and a runner off first for the first out of the sixth.

The only run Tardugno would need was unearned and came in the bottom of the third inning on an infield error and Darwin Gonzalez' (LAWRENCE, MA) single up the middle.

WESTERN KNOCKS OFF TOP-SEEDED EASTERN IN LEC BASEBALL

Colonials stay alive in tournament, snap Warriors' eight-game LEC streak

MANSFIELD, CT – Eben McKnight (WINDSOR, CT) drove in Nick Parker (OLD SAYBROOK, CT) from third base with a one-out single in the bottom of the seventh inning to snap a tie and give fourth-seeded Western Connecticut State University a 5-4 victory over top-seeded Eastern Connecticut State University Thursday afternoon on the second day of the Little East Conference Baseball Tournament at the Eastern Baseball Stadium.

With the win, Western (17-21) stays alive in the tournament and advances to play sixth-seeded University of Massachusetts Boston (17-21) Friday at 3:30 p.m. Two-time defending champion Eastern (29-12), which had a string of eight straight wins in this tournament snapped, plays at noon Friday against the loser of Thursday's late game between Rhode Island College and the University of Southern Maine. Rhode Island and Southern Maine entered tonight's game after tournament-opener wins.

Western, which has beaten Eastern twice in three games this year, squandered a 4-1 lead but scored the decisive run in the seventh. With one out, Eastern reliever Ben O'Brien (MONTVILLE) walked Parker. D.J. Mulhall singled him to third and McKnight slapped an RBI single into left field.

Mike Troester (NEW MILFORD, CT) allowed only one hit after relieving starter Brian Krost (STAMFORD) with one out and the go-ahead run on first in the top of the seventh inning. Troester (2-1) allowed two baserunners the rest of the way. He ended the seventh by getting a fly ball to center and a ground ball to first and left the tying run stranded at second in the ninth by striking out Eastern's top hitter – Zach Mehrbach (LYME, NH) – on a called strike.

Jon Lynch (GLASTONBURY) had two hits and drove in two runs for Western. He gave the Colonials a 1-0 lead in the first with an infield single and walked with the bases loaded in the fifth to give Western a 4-1 lead.

Trailing 4-1, Eastern tied the game in the sixth by scoring three runs on three hits and an error but Krost got an infield ground ball to leave the bases loaded. RHODE ISLAND LONE UNBEATEN IN LEC BASEBALL TOURNAMENT Five-run sixth inning leads Anchormen past Southern Maine, 7-4

MANSFIELD, CT – The fifth-seeded Rhode Island College baseball team erased a two-run deficit by scoring five runs in the bottom of the sixth inning in a 7-4 win over third-seeded University of Southern Maine in a winners' bracket game of the 2005 Little East Conference Baseball Tournament Thursday night at the Eastern Baseball Stadium on the Eastern Connecticut State University campus.

The win is the second in as many tournament games for Rhode Island (17-19), which is the only remaining undefeated team in the original six-team, double-elimination tournament. The Anchormen, who had won only one game in the double-elimination stage of the tournament in eight years prior to 2005, will play Friday night at 7 p.m. They will play the winner of a noon game between Southern Maine (25-13) and top-seeded Eastern Connecticut State University.

Trailing 4-2, Rhode Island batted around in the sixth inning against three Southern Maine pitchers. Two walks with one out began the rally and leadoff hitter **Peter Olson (NORTH PROVIDENCE, RI)** tied the game

with a one-out, two-run double. After an infield error, Olson scored the goahead run on **Chris Higgins'** (**SWANSEA**, **MA**) double. **Jim Connell's** (**SMITHFIELD**, **RI**) RBI single and a wild pitch pushed the lead to 7-4.

Batting eighth and ninth, respectively, in the Rhode Island order, Chris Smaldone (JOHNSON, RI) and Jamie Aldoupolis (ASHLAND, MA) reached base seven times on three hits, three walks and an error, scored three runs and drove in two. Warriors rally for second-game win to gain top seed for upcoming tournament

KEENE, NH – The Eastern Connecticut State University baseball team broke a tic by scoring four unearned runs in the top of the ninth inning in an 8-4 victory over Keene State College to gain a split of Sunday's regular-season ending Little East Conference doubleheader and clinch the top seed in the upcoming conference tournament.

Needing one win to earn its fourth straight outright regular-season championship (28-11, 11-3 little east), Eastern lost the first game by a score of 1-0 and trailed 3-1 late in the second game before rallying in the final two innings.

For the fourth straight year, Eastern will host the six-team, double-climination tournament beginning Wednesday at the Eastern Baseball Stadium. The Warriors have won the last two tournament titles at home after Western Connecticut claimed the 2002 championship at Mansfield.

Keene (22-13, 9-5 little east) finishes with a share of second place in the final conference standings with the University of Southern Maine and is the guaranteed No. 2 seed. Western Connecticut State University is three games back with a 7-5 record but has a makeup doubleheader Tuesday with the University of Masachusetts Boston. If Western sweeps, the Colonials will forge a three-way tie for second in the final regular-season standings and will be the No. 3 seed and Southern Maine the No. 4 seed. If Western splits or loses two, the Colonials will drop to the No. 4 seed and Southern Maine will be the No. 3 seed. Rhode Island College and Massachusetts Boston are guaranteed as the No. 5 and No. 6 seed, respectively. UMass Dartmouth and Plymouth State did not qualify.

Trailing 3-1 in the second game against Keene, Eastern scored three runs in the eighth inning to take a 4-3 lead. WESTERN'S KROST SILENCES EASTERN BASEBALL 8-2

Junior transfer carries no-hitter into eighth in Colonials' Little East win

DANBURY, Conn. – Junior righty Brian Krost carried a no-hitter into the eighth inning, eventually settling for a complete-game two-hitter as the Western Connecticut State University baseball team defeated Little East Conference leader Eastern Connecticut State University, 8-2 Sunday afternoon at Westside Field.

Krost (4-3), a first-year transfer from the University of Rhode Island, didn't allow a hit and allowed only five baserunners through seven innings and carried an 8-0 lead into the eighth. He hit senior shortstop **Tom Koch (WARWICK, RI)** leading off the eighth and with one out, surrendered his first hit and run when Eastern senior leftfielder **Jason Pekrul (BERLIN)** singled to left-center field, scoring Koch from second. In the ninth, Krost walked leadoff batter **Marc Garofalo (SOUTH KINGSTOWN, RI)**. With one out, junior first baseman **Chris DeSantis (SHREWSBURY, MA)** drove in Garofalo from second with a single to center.

Eastern (25-9, 9-2 little east) freshman righty **Joe Esposito (EAST HAVEN)** was driven from the game after walking the leadoff batter in the third inning. He was charged with four (earned) runs on six hits while walking three and striking out none. The loss was the first for Esposito (5-2) after five straight wins. His only previous loss came in a 19-0 loss at Salisbury University nearly two months ago.

Western (14-15, 5-3 little east) collected 15 hits off five Eastern pitchers, scoring three times in the bottom of the first and three more in the third. Eleven of Western's hit were singles.

Western's T.J. Tarantino was 4-for-5, Andy Powers 3-for-3 and Eben McKnight 3-for-4. Jon Lynch had two doubles and Chris Kaplan drove in two runs and scored two.

The win snaps a streak of 23 straight losses to Eastern, including a 14-0 setback earlier this year at the Eastern Baseball Stadium. Eastern holds a 56-3 series lead.

Eastern visits Rhode Island College Monday at 3:30 p.m. for a Little East Conference single game. That game was rained out Saturday after Eastern won a rain-shortened opener, 12-0 behind junior lefty **Ryan DiPietro's** (KENSINGTON) no-hitter.

A winner of the last three conference regular-season titles, Eastern needs at least two wins in its three remaining regular-season conference games to finish with at least a share of the title. The No. 1 seed will host the six-team, double-elimination tournament May 11-14.

BRIAN KROST NEARLY NO HITS EASTERN CONNECTICUT IN COLONIALS 8-2 WIN

Junior righty strikes out 10 with no hitter into the 8th Inning

DANBURY, CT – Junior right hander Brian Krost (Stamford, CT) carried a no-hitter into the eight inning and kept Eastern Connecticut State University hitters off balance all afternoon as the Western Connecticut State University baseball team defeated the Warriors, 8-2 in the Little East Conference Westside Field Sunday afternoon.

Krost, a transfer from University of Rhode Island, allowed two earned runs, walked four and hit three batters. He improves to 4-3 on the season and has now defeated two powerful LEC opponents on back-to-back weekends. He went the distance last weekend in the Colonials 8-6 come-from-behind victory over Southern Maine.

The Colonials' victory on Sunday broke a 23-game win streak by Eastern Connecticut. WestConn last defeated the Warriors, 9-7 in Williamntic on May 3, 1995.

The Warriors' Jason Pekrul (Berlin, CT) broke up the no hitter with one out in the eighth with a line drive to left center field.

Chris DeSantis (Shrewsbury, MA) added a single to center in the ninth inning.

The Colonials, which led 8-0 through seven innings, belted out 15 hits on the afternoon including four doubles.

TJ Tarantino (Rutherford, NY) went 4-for-5 with one RBI.

Eben McKnight (Windsor, CT) came to the plate with bases loaded in the third inning after Eastern intentionally walked WestConn's leading hitter DJ Mulhall (Stratford, CT) for the second time. He was immediately hit by a pitch for the ninth time this season, forcing in the Colonials' sixth run. McNight went 3-for4 on the afternoon.

Chris Kaplan (Stratford, CT) helped get WestConn out to a 3-0 lead in the first inning when he laced a two-RBI double down the right field line off starter and loser Joe Esposito (East Haven, CT).

Esposito was the first of five pitchers for the Warriors on Sunday. He went two innings, allowed six hits and walked four before being replaced by Trey Bongiovanni (Meriden, CT). Esposito falls to 5-2 on the year.

Andy Powers (Stratford, CT) went 3-for-3 and had two RBIs for Western Connecticut

WestConn improves to 14-15 overall and 5-3 in the league. Eastern Connecticut, the nation's 13th ranked team in Division III, drop to 25-9 overall and 9-2 in the LEC.

WestConn hosts Mitchell College at Westside Field this Tuesday at 4 p.m.

EASTERN'S DIPIETRO NO-HITS RHODE ISLAND COLLEGE 12-0

Becomes first pitcher in program history to be part of two no-hitters

PROVIDENCE, RI – Junior left-handed pitcher **Ryan DiPietro (KENSINGTON)** pitched a no-hitter and fanned 11 batters in a game stopped after six innings due to rain as the Eastern Connecticut State University baseball team defeated Rhode Island College 12-0 Saturday in a Little East Conference game Saturday. The second game was postponed and is scheduled to be played Monday at 3:30 p.m.at Rhode Island College.

DiPietro (6-1) becomes the first Eastern pitcher to be part of two no-hitters in his career. On March 29, he threw seven perfect innings before eventually combining on a no-hitter with **Brian Wendell (SOUTH KINGSTOWN, RI)** in a 7-0 home win over Westfield State College in the northern opener. With his 27th win in 30 career decisions, DiPietro moves into sole possession of fourth place all-time in wins, one behind Jeff Brewer ('83).

DiPietro and Rhode Island senior righty James Milano were locked in a scoreless battle before Eastern (25-8, 9-1 little east) scored five runs in the fourth on three hits and three errors and broke it open with seven more runs on seven hits in the fifth.

Senior leftfielder Jason Pekrul (BERLIN), sophomore second baseman Alex Cardona (WEST HAVEN) and sophomore catcher Matt Cooney (ARLINGTON, MA) had a hit in both of those innings for Eastern, which capitalized on three Rhode Island (12-15, 5-4 little east) errors to score four unearned runs in the fourth. Junior third baseman Zach Mehrbach (LYME, NH) drove in three runs in the two scoring innings with a sacrifice fly and two-run double; Pekrul drove in two with a two-run single, Cardona drove in two with a double and single, Cooney drove in a pair with a double and sophomore centerfielder Randy Re (DANBURY) drove in two with a two-run home run. The homer came in the fifth and was his team-leading sixth of the year and fourth in the last eight games. In those eight games, Re is batting .441 (15-for-34) with 15 RBI, 13 runs and six stolen bases.

Six Eastern batters finished with at least two hits, with Pekrul collecting three. Rhode Island was the only team to defeat Eastern in 14 conference regular-season games last year.

In winning 19 of 22 games up north, Eastern is batting .371 and averaging 9.9 runs and 14.1 hits.

Eastern visits Western Connecticut State University Sunday at 1 p.m. Freshman righty **Joe Esposito (EAST HAVEN)** is expected to open on the mound. Esposito is 5-1 with a 1.77 ERA. Sophomore lefty **Rob Cremins (STOUGHTON, MA)** is scheduled to face Rhode Island Monday.

EASTERN BASEBALL PULLS AWAY FROM WESLEYAN, 12-3

Warriors score eight runs in final three innings, improve northern record to 18-3

MIDDLETOWN, Conn. -- Alex Cardona (WEST HAVEN) and Tom Koch (WARWICK, RI) combined for four hits, five runs and four RBI to help lift the Eastern Connecticut State University baseball team to a 12-3 win over Wesleyan University Wednesday afternoon.

Ranked 13th nationally, Eastern (24-8) scored eight runs in its final three at-bats to move out from a tight 4-3 advantage and defeat Wesleyan (5-20) for the 11th straight time. The Warriors have won 18 of 21 games up north this year.

Cardona, a first-year sophomore second baseman, was 2-for-3 with his third home run of the season, three runs scored and two RBI. Koch, a senior shortstop, was 2-for-3 with two runs scored and two RBI. With Eastern trailing 2-0, Cardona hit his second home run in three games with one out in the second and junior leftfielder **Greg Sullivan** (NEEDHAM, MA) tied the game when he drove in Koch with a bunt single. Koch put Eastern ahead for good in the fourth with a two-run, opposite-field double to right.

Senior leftfielder Jason Pekrul (BERLIN) came off the bench to pick up two hits in two at-bats and also robbed Wesleyan senior catcher Mac Clonan of a leadoff home run in the seventh with a running catch that propelled him over a four foot high temporary fence.

Leading 4-3, the Warriors scored three unearned runs without a hit in the seventh when the Cardinals committed four of their seven errors. Eastern blew the game open in the ninth by scorning five runs on three hits, two walks, twi sacrifice flies and an error. Sophomore Eric O'Toole (WATERBURY) plated two of the runs with a pinch bases-loaded single.

Junior right-handed pitcher Alex Narus (PROSPECT) won his second game in a week, pitching into the seventh inning and leaving with a 7-3 lead. Narus, who won his first game at Eastern in a starting role, allowed five singles while fanning five and walking one. Narus had pitched 3 2/3 innings in relief last Wednesday in a 10-7 win at Bridgewater State – his first win at Eastern.

Eastern visits Rhode Island College Saturday at noon for a Little East Conference doubleheader.

NO. 1 TRINITY COLLEGE DOWNS NO.2 EASTERN BASEBALL, 8-4

Fries' two-run double in sixth inning gives Bantams the lead for good

HARTFORD, Conn. + Senior catcher Andrew Fries doubled home two runs to snap a tie in the sixth inning and the Trinity College baseball team went on to an 8-4 win over Eastern Connecticut State University Tuesday afternoon in a battle of the top two-ranked Division III teams in New England.

Ranked No. 7 nationally, Trinity (24-5) broke a five-game losing streak at the hands of No. 13 Eastern (23-8). The Warriors had won five straight this year and 17 of 19 northern games heading into the contest.

Trailing 3-2, Trinity tied the game in the bottom of the fourth inning with an unearned run that was driven in by freshman Chandler Barnard's two-out single. The Bantams went ahead for good when they scored two runs in the sixth on three hits, an infield error, sacrifice bunt and intentional walk. An error, single, sacrifice bunt and intentional walk loaded the bases for Fries, who doubled to center to plate two runs and give the Bantams a 5-3 lead.

Trinity's 2-3-4 batters of Barnard, senior third baseman Jeff Natale and junior first baseman Erik Paisley combined for eight of their team's 14 hits, scored three runs and drove in two.
